Students are allowed to choose any combination of courses from the various courses offered according to the criteria and syllabus announced by Himachal Pradesh University. Additionally, the college offers multidisciplinary add-on courses in partnership with Himachal Pradesh Kaushal Vikas Nigam to provide students with even more options. These courses are open to students from all academic disciplines. Beginning in the next academic session, the college will prioritize increasing the number of multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary courses. During this time, all applicants will have access to a variety of skill-enhancing courses, general elective courses, and ability-enhancing courses. The college aims to provide holistic development opportunities for the students by offering a range of courses that broaden their education beyond their subject knowledge. This approach is in line with the New Education Policy 2020, which Himachal Pradesh University plans to implement starting in the academic session 2023-24, giving students more opportunities to take up generic optional and skill improvement courses across all programs while exercising academic freedom and adopting a multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approach. As an affiliated institution of Himachal Pradesh University, Government College Una strictly adheres to the courses designed by the university. The Himachal University, of which Government College Una is an affiliated institution, plans to implement the New Education Policy 2020 from the upcoming academic session 2024-25. The college library supports curriculum access with a vast collection of over 22,000 books, journals, newspapers, and various online and offline resources. Additionally, the college organizes educational tours and field trips to enrich the learning experience. Curriculum delivery is effectively managed using a mix of traditional and ICT-based methods, promoting peer learning,

individualized coaching, faculty induction programs, and overall efficient curriculum execution.

To integrate moral and human values, the college offers numerous extracurricular activities through NCC, NSS, Rovers and Rangers, Eco-club, Red Ribbon Club, and the Red Cross Society. The institution evaluates students' learning levels and organizes special programmes for both advanced learners and slow learners. Peer learning is encouraged, with students teaching each other. Professors identify slow and fast learners through face-to-face interactions and continue to support students beyond classroom hours. Students are encouraged to use the library's reference amenities and e-resources. Advanced learners have access to more challenging assignments, graded exams, research papers, and topics beyond the curriculum. Experiential Learning:

The Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) with Outcome Based Education (OBE) promotes student-centric learning. Students gain practical experience through industry tours and summer internships, along with entrepreneurial training to become "job creators" rather than "job seekers."

Participatory Learning: Traditional pedagogy is blended with handson activities such as group activities, role plays, movie screenings, and debates. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) provide practical training, while activities like essay writing, collage making, and poster making further develop skills. 2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The Internal Examination Committee oversees the college's internal examinations. As per university policy, core and elective papers undergo internal evaluation worth 30 points out of 100, with the remaining 70 points awarded through semester-end external exams. For the 30 point internal assessment mandated by HP University, 10 points are allocated for assignments, 15 for tests and projects, and 5 for attendance. Teachers prepare question papers considering the prescribed syllabus, ensuring at least 75% of it is covered in class. The college maintains complete transparency in awarding internal assessments by displaying student performance on notice boards. Attendance-based marks, up to a maximum of 5, are allotted according to the university guidelines. Students involved in extracurricular activities such as sports, N.C.C., and N.S.S. are given extra time for their assignments. Those who fail to meet the minimum passing criteria in internal assessments are provided another opportunity for improvement.

The institution employs a three-tier grievance redressal mechanism to address student complaints at the faculty, department, and college levels. The college proactively identifies and resolves examination-related issues. After evaluations, checked answer sheets are shown to students for verification. Any necessary corrections to marks are made immediately by faculty members. For grievances related to overall internal assessments, students can approach the concerned teacher directly. If unresolved, the student can escalate the issue to the HOD. This ensures transparency and reliability in the internal evaluation process. If the department cannot resolve the issue, the college-level committee, led by the Internal Assessment Coordinator and the concerned HOD, intervenes. Common grievances include non-receipt of admit cards, withheld results, incorrect mark entries, the need for scribes for blind and physically challenged students, misspelled names, out-of-syllabus questions, and other discrepancies.

Every day, Grade-IV employees are assigned with maintaining the entire college campus; expert labourers are engaged on a frequent basis to handle setup-related repairs.

On the website of the institution, there is a comprehensive manual available with notices along with details about the admission process, costs, subjects, curriculum, sports, and other activities, as well as schedules.

Recently, the newly constructed Arts Block with classrooms, faculty rooms, and additional areas have been added.

The college also has operational readdressal cell, anti-ragging cell, sexual harassment cell, career guidance cell and various committees. The institute features state-of-the-art physics, chemistry, botany, zoology, geography, computer, and language labs, as well as conference room and smart classrooms furnished with the newest software, digital podiums, CCTV cameras, and projectors. The organisation has a dedicated server and network optical fibre for optimal internal signal dissemination. The college website is also updated on a regular basis. In addition to 23582 textbooks, 1030 reference books, 80409 e-books, and 3828 e-journals, users can access a well-equipped library with photocopier, CCTV, and Internet access.

4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

The college library is equipped with SOUL (Software for University Libraries) by INFLIBNET, ensuring efficient management through ILMS (Integrated Library Management System). This system is integral to handling diverse library operations effectively.

To facilitate online access, the library provides 8 computers with Wi-Fi connectivity. Users, including faculty and students, can access e-books and e-journals through personal log-ins on both library and personal devices. Currently, the library has 1644 users registered in N-list, out of which 1239 are active, 378 are pending, and 27 have invalid email addresses. An annual budget of approximately Rs. 6000 is allocated for ensuring uninterrupted online access to resources.

In terms of physical resources, the library houses a substantial collection of over 24,000 books and subscribes to 25 journals. Additionally, it provides access to 13 magazines and newspapers. The library is segmented into a reading room, reference section, and book lending/return area. Notably, the reading room can accommodate up to 100 students simultaneously, ensuring a conducive environment for study and research.

Overall, the college library is dedicated to supporting the academic needs of faculty and students with its comprehensive resources and robust management systems, thereby fostering a conducive learning environment.
